Celebrating 100 Years of Hollywood and the Lakes!

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This year, Hollywood celebrates the 100th anniversary of its incorporation as a city in the state of Florida. The city's founder, Joseph W. Young, Jr., first visited this area in 1919 looking for a location to build his "Dream City" that would include ocean front properties, a central business district, and a wide variety of residential neighborhoods to accommodate all income levels.

Our Hollywood Lakes neighborhood played an important part in the city's development. Following the City Beautiful movement that encouraged thoughtful planning for urban development. Young envisioned

a central business district with a wide boulevard extending east to the ocean, including a circle park at the edge of downtown with a hotel to welcome tourists and future homeowners

The land east of 14th Avenue was a marshy wetland that extended to the Intracoastal Waterway. Young and his engineering and design team created the plans for a 100-footwide boulevard extending from the circle park to the beach barrier island. The North and South Lakes were dredged to build up the land on

either side of the planned Hollywood Boulevard, which also allowed for additional residential lots in the new "Lakes Section." Young chose to locate his own home here, at 1055 Hollywood Boulevard, completed in 1925.

Like the rest of Hollywood, the Lakes section grew sporadically over the past century, which is reflected in the many different styles of architecture throughout the neighborhood. For residential properties, Young's company encouraged builders and owners to design within three styles: Spanish mission revival, Adobe, and Bungalow. You can still see examples of all three of these styles in the Lakes homes built in the 1920's and 30s, along with more modern designs though the decades.

There are many ways for Lakes residents to celebrate the Centennial. A committee of representatives from all 6 commission districts and city government developed a busy schedule of events throughout 2025. These include adding Centennial programming and branding to existing city events such as My Hollywood Pride, the Party on the J, and the Candy Cane Parade. Additionally, the city has added new events, including the Ignite light show in the ArtsPark in February, as well as the Historical Society's History Hunt and Disco Ball (the HLCA will host a History of Hollywood Lakes



in June). The culminating event of the year will be in November, the weekend before Thanksgiving with the Vintage Festival in Young Circle and downtown. Visit the city's webpage, www.hollywoodfl.org, for more information on Centennial events.

The Historical Society has launched two initiatives for the Centennial year to engage a broad cross section of the community. In collaboration with the city's Partnership for Engaged Neighborhoods (PEN) program,

HHS is collecting memorabilia and oral histories from neighborhood civic associations to document their stories through its Neighborhood History Project. HHS is also working with local service organizations to collect their histories. The Time Capsule 2125 project teams local high school students with the Leadership Hollywood Class 48 to identify leaders in groups such as Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions, and tape interviews with students and adults talking about the history of their organizations and their vision for what the future of Hollywood could look like 100 years from now. 

Late Filing Exemption Deadline - September 17, 2025

Your Homestead Exemption automatically renews each year provided there is no change in the ownership or use of the property. If you are already receiving Homestead Exemption on your current home, you do not need to reapply.

If you have not yet applied for your 2025 Homestead Exemption, Limited-Income Senior Exemption or any other exemption, you can still file until September 17, 2025. To view all the tax-saving exemptions available to qualified applicants, please visit our website at https://web.bcpa.net/bcpaclient/#/Homestead.

Senior Exemption: This exemption is both age and income-based and must be applied for separately from the Homestead Exemption. To be eligible for this exemption, an applicant must be age 65 or older as of January 1, 2025 and have a household adjusted gross income for 2024 not exceeding \$37,694. To view the exemption requirements and to apply online, please visit our website at https://web.bcpa.net/bcpaclient/#/SeniorExemption.

Disability Exemption: This exemption is available to every blind person or totally and permanently disabled person who is a bona fide resident of Florida. Here is the link to the exemption requirements: https://web.bcpa.net/bcpaclient/#/DisabilityExemption.

Veteran & Military Exemptions: Veterans with a service-connected disability and the un-remarried surviving spouse are entitled to an additional exemption. An active duty servicemember who is receiving Homestead Exemption may qualify for an additional exemption if deployed outside the United States serving in support of designated military operations. Please visit https://web.bcpa.net/bcpaclient/#/VeteransExemption to review the Veteran & Military Exemption requirements and online applications.

Surviving Spouse of First Responder Exemption: Un-remarried surviving spouses of a first responder who died in the line of duty may be eligible for an exemption of the full assessed value of a Homesteaded property. Once the September 17, 2025 statutory "late filing" deadline has closed, we cannot accept any more 2025 exemption applications regardless of any good cause reason for missing the late filing deadline.

Property owners who moved to a new home in 2025 can pre-file for tax year 2026 at https:// bcpa.net/homesteadonline_with_portability/web/index.aspx.

DISTRICT 1 REPORT By Commissioner Caryl Shuham

Can you believe it's almost Spring! Hollywood's Centennial year is off to a fantastic start. We've already had several hugely successful events in honor of our 100th birthday, like Party on the J and Ignite Art & Light Festival! Be sure not to miss out on any of the upcoming Centennial events – check www.hollywoodfl. org/1538/Events-Calendar.

I want to pause here to express my enormous appreciation for the ongoing work of the City's

Centennial Committee and the Hollywood Historical Society. Without these organizations, our centennial year would not be unfolding in the incredible way that it is. The Hollywood Historical Society (HHS) is also celebrating a milestone this year - it is 50 years young! Under the passionate leadership of its board and its president Clive Taylor, as well as its Executive Director Andy Ruffner, the HHS has become a powerhouse of programming and educational events throughout the entire City. Hollywood's rich history is being shared and preserved by the many volunteers working with HHS whose mission is "To collect, maintain, and share information about the history of Hollywood, Florida. To advocate the preservation of our historical resources and landmarks. To educate and encourage public awareness of Hollywood's diverse heritage. And to create an enduring legacy of Hollywood history for succeeding generations." Over 100 years ago when Joseph Young embarked on the exciting and forward thinking idea of Hollywood-by-the-Sea, it was planned as a City Beautiful to be enjoyed by all. As I write this article, I have to believe that Mr. Young would be saddened by the news coming out of Washington. After decades of work by both major American political parties to insure no one would be discriminated against or left behind simply because of their race, religion, or gender, the current administration is sending us back in time. I am confident Hollywood will not follow suit and will continue to work to increase equal access for all of our residents and to maintain our phenomenal score of 100 on the Municipal Equality Index (MEI) which we have sustained since first achieving it in 2021.

Our Department of Public Utilities is working hard to reduce flooding risks in our City's low-lying areas. The Storm Water Master Plan will soon come back to the Commission where we will discuss the best approach to implement early critical improvements within the plan and how best to pay for them. In the meantime, DPU staff continues working on system maintenance, improvements and projects already in the works to free up water flow throughout our canals and to minimize flooding on our streets.

As many of you may have heard, the developer of the potential private-public partnership (P3) at the beach community center at 1301 S. Ocean Drive has requested additional time under its contract to get the necessary government approvals in order to proceed with the project. It seeks additional time pursuant to a state statute that grants time extensions for certain development activities when the subject project is in an area covered by a state of emergency declared the Governor. The beach community center site is within the jurisdiction covered by the two states of emergency declared by the Governor as a result of both Hurricane Ian and Hurricane Milton. As of this writing, I have not yet learned if the developer's request for this additional time is valid or binding on the City.

You may have noticed several additional security measures downtown and along the Broadwalk. The Hollywood Police Department has taken measures to enhance security in both areas including the placement of various barriers. Per HPD, these are temporary while they continue to add additional measures. I am currently working with staff to find ways to accomplish HPD's safety goals in a more aesthetically appealing manner along the new downtown streetscape and the finished street ends at the Broadwalk. Together, we will keep Hollywood safe and beautiful!

Finally, I want to share some very exciting news. Broward County Public Schools is moving forward to convert Hollywood Central Elementary school (HCE) to a kindergarten-eighth (K-8) grade school. This is something we have been hoping for and working towards for years. For too long, despite being a terrific elementary school, HCE has been under enrolled. Converting it into a K-8 school will be wonderful for families in the community. The tentative plan is to add a grade each year for the next three years. This school year, HCE welcomed a new principal, Christine Centrone. She and Assistant Principal Marc Horowitz are both so kind, smart and dynamic and I cannot think of a better team to lead HCE during such an exciting transformation. Thank you to the entire School Board for this reimaging of HCE - especially to our newly elected District 1 representative, Maura McCarthy Bulman!

DISHING THE DIRT

The January fires in Los Angelos, California have once again proved the incredible force, fury and power of nature with tragic results for thousands of people. Lives, homes, businesses, places of worship and education were lost. Family, friends and neighbors were uprooted and scattered. All of us can, sadly, be only an event away from a similar fate, be it from fires, floods, the winds of a hurricane or a tornado. We have been blessed here in our neighborhood of the Lakes to have been mostly spared over these last years.

Please keep in your thoughts and prayers those in Southern California, North Carolina, or even closer to home, those on the SW coast of Florida, and continue to help in any way you can.

Whatever your cause, be it the homeless or housing, the environment or resiliency, food and clothing or pets and animal safety, there is a nonprofit, a charity or go fund me page that you can support. Hopefully, we will never face what our neighbors are going through and whatever small help we give now will ease their burden. We will all be the better for it.

I will spare any further warning on hurricane preparedness and save for the spring newsletter and offer observations from the garden. January and the winter months are the blooming season for Starburst Clerodendrum (Clerodendrum quadriloculare) ...and they are fabulous.

On the end of my street alone, there are at least five gorgeous examples. From the UF/IFAS extension page: ... so named for its flowers that resemble delicate white stars shooting forth with a lovely pink tail trailing in their wake, this plant makes a lovely! (my emphasis here:



to put it mildly,) small specimen tree.

Starburst is a member of the mint family (Lamiaceae) and native to New Guinea and the Philippines. Typically reaching a height of 15 feet, this plant is most eye-catching in mid-winter and early spring when its showy tubular flowerswhite tipped and pink below— appear in large clusters. Hummingbirds and long-tongued butterflies love to visit these tubular flowers for their sweet energizing nectar.

The rest of the year, it's the foliage that's the point of interest. The top sides of the leaves are (dark) green, with just a tinge of purple, while the undersides are a glossy, deep purple. During the wintertime, leaves may lose a bit of their luster, but take heart that blooming is just around the corner. Hopefully, you have noticed them as you walk or drive along our streets or bike through our neighborhoods.

I was fortunate /smart/ scathingly brilliant enough to buy a different cultivar (Bridal Veil? Wedding Bells?) of Clerodendrum at a local nursery about 18 months or so ago. A small plant w pretty white flowers (for my dream future moonlight garden) in a three gallon pot seemed a good choice ... and so very glad that I did. Days later, I went back and bought the last two at the nursery. And NOW, established, it has long trails of small white flowers and just continues to bloom. Magnificent.

It is such a thrill to see such pretty plants blooming in the yard and sad to not see them sold anywhere since. Until this past January when I spied it at another, not quite so close, nursery. I was about to buy a few more and go wild in the yard. BUT.... now, at \$49!!! for a 3 gallon pot, I have to hope it can propagate by cuttings and self-seeding. I will let you know and be happy to share.

So, as this Newsletter arrives in your mailbox, March is always an iffy month for me for gardening. Although the big box stores have plenty of tempting annuals coming in, I never have enough clean pots or space and area ready. March is also one of the driest months, with April being the driest of the year. (Or ever have enough time to water both the front and back yard.)

But March is another month that make people up north love South Florida: with average temperatures in mid to high 70's, and mostly sunny days, it's a pleasure to be out in the garden. With little rainfall and occasionally very windy days, it is crucial to remember to water the newest flowers and vegetables as you start planting. Happy spring to all....and slainte for those who celebrate the green!







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BOARD AT WORK

Here are some issues the HLCA Board of Directors have been discussing at our monthly Board meetings:

-School Zoning Code Amendments: As some of you will recall, a private school applied for a Special Exception in 2023 to have a school on the first four floors of the Home Tower. This plan was rightfully rejected by City Staff and, ultimately, the City Commission which heard the item that year. The reasons for denial were many as this location is far too congested and dangerous for students. With no adequate parking or viable drop off/pick up plan, the Commission saw that this location was totally unacceptable for a second school on that property. The HAAS School with 1,500 students creates a major traffic nightmare in Downtown Hollywood twice each day. With more and more hi-rise developments in Downtown coming on line, the traffic will only worsen. The revised zoning code will prevent private schools from opening in any inappropriate location. The HLCA fully supports these zoning amendments.

-Proper Recycling: The Dept. of Public Works is trying to educate residents on the proper recycling procedures as some of the recycled material that Waste Pro processes does not meet certain standards. Many items are "dirty" or not properly rinsed out so these items must be disposed of as trash in land-fills. This issue will be discussed in detail at our March 11th General Meeting. Be sure to be there!

- Lakes Squatter Signage: You may notice some barges and heavy equipment in both North and South Lake over the next few months. Thanks to a Broward County ordinance passed in 2023, the City of Hollywood can now erect signage in the lakes advising any boaters who drop anchor that they have a maximum of 45 days before they must vacate the lake and not return for six months. This new law has virtually eliminated the squatter problem. In addition, all



the half sunken, derelict vessels have been removed. The HLCA thanks the City, Broward County and, in particular the Police Marine Patrol for making this happen.

- **Code Compliance:** The Director of Code Compliance and Parking, Jovan Douglas, did a presentation at a recent City Commission meeting on Code Compliance. We learned that the leading code violations in Hollywood are:

- Garbage
- Property Standards (grass, weeds, junk on lawns, etc.)
- Vacation Rental problems
- Unpermitted construction work
- Lawn and/or sidewalk parking violations.

Lithium Battery Safety

At the HLCA February General Meeting our Guest Speaker, Hollywood's Dept. of Fire/Rescue Battalion Chief Brian Brown, gave a very informative presentation on Lithium ion batteries and their safety issues. As we know, Lithium batteries are used in more and more consumer products and have been for many years. Your cell phone has a Lithium battery. Electric bikes and scooters as well as lawn equipment and, of course, your electric car all use Lithium ion batteries. The issue is the potential for fires caused by these batteries. Why and how do they catch fire?

One of the main reasons why lithium ion batteries can catch fire or fail is due to thermal runaway. This process can occur within the battery if it becomes too hot, and it causes a chain reaction that can ultimately lead to a fire. In addition, thermal runaway can happen if a battery is exposed to abused conditions such as high temperatures, physical abuse or if it is charged improperly. Here are some reasons:

- **Overcharging:** Charging a battery for too long or with too much voltage can cause it to overheat.
- **Exposure to heat:** High temperatures can cause the battery to age faster and become unstable.
- **Physical damage:** Crushing, puncturing, or dropping a battery can cause it to become unstable.
- Using improper charging equipment: Using a charger that isn't designed for the battery can cause it to overheat.
- Manufacturing defects: Batteries may have defects or contamination introduced during manufacturing.
- Short-circuiting: A short-circuit can cause a battery to catch fire.
- **Cell malfunctions:** A malfunction in a battery cell can cause it to catch fire.
- System faults: A fault in the battery's system can cause it to catch fire.
- **Exposure to water:** Water can damage a battery and increase the risk of fire

Water can be used to extinguish a Lithium battery fire. However, Lithium-ion batteries and the devices that contain them should not go in household garbage or recycling bins. They can cause fires during transport or at landfills and recyclers. Instead, lithium ion batteries should be taken to separate recycling or house-

hold hazardous waste collection points. Many stores that sell large quantities of lithium ion batteries will have a recycling program where you can return the batteries. Your local waste management or recycling center should be able to take lithium ion batteries as well.



So if you own any products with Lithium ion batteries, be sure to take these safety issues into account.

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
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GOOD EATIN' IN THE LAKES!

Life is about exploring the pasta-bilities. And what better place to do that than here in the beautiful tasteful diverse Lakes neighborhood we call home.

Though my name screams of "Italian" heritage I am an eclectic mix of Italian, German, Polish and French so growing up meals were a mish mash of all of that along with what was trendy in the 60's and 70's food market. Jello salad, tuna noodle casserole and boxed meal offerings in the mix with a side of canned or frozen vegetables, anyone? And full disclosure, when my brother and I got to pick out a tv dinner once in a blue moon my choice was some sort of "Italian" parmesan meat/pasta offering smothered with cheese and sauce chosen because of the sides and dessert it came with. I mean who can blame me as canned pears with a scoop of cream cheese most likely copied from a magazine or pudding with skin (because who knew how to keep the pudding skin free back then) was a treat of a dessert from my Mother's repertoire early on when dessert was even offered on that rare special occasion or after reading one of the many magazines heavy on the newest recipe offerings that came in the mail

Now that I'm more fully invested in food prep in my own right and we are well past the processed food era many of us grew up in my food choices and ingredients are more expansive and well thought out even though I do still love a good side dish and well, flipping through magazines was inherited so there's that. Here are a few easy to toss together recipes I recently viewed that showcase some pasta-bilities but also leave room for some other diverse tastes to add spice (season, salad, side dish and dessert as you wish).

This first offering is a nod to the early days when my now husband and I first got engaged. I was on a meal track as a party of one that focused on no fuss meal prep with a nod to nutrition and considerate of the single income budget as an educator. My soon to be husband went along pretty willingly with my meal offerings for a while until one night he said "This looks great, babe." And then tentatively added "Will there be any meat with this?" And so just like all the different stages of life when tastes, and circumstances and relationships ebb and flow I expanded, shifted and varied the meal prep to include other options added to the daily meal offerings...um, like meat.

I have yet to make this recipe for Marry Me Chicken but as my husband and I bear down on er, prepare to celebrate our 25th wedding anniversary (with our palates and pastabilities still expanding) this is on my list to try because it mimics his love of pulled pork and indeed there is "meat with this." A non "pulled" version is available with a recipe search that looks good enough to "commit to" as well.

Crockpot Marry Me Chicken (A variation on Tuscan Chicken)

Place chicken in crock pot. Season with salt, pepper, and Italian seasoning. Add the pressed garlic. Pour the sun-dried tomatoes, including the oil, over the chicken and add the diced onion. Cover and cook on high for 2.5-3 hours, or low for 3.5-4 hours until chicken is cooked through. Shred the chicken and mix into the juices. Add the cream cheese on top, re-cover and let it sit to soften then stir the cream cheese into the chicken along with the parmesan cheese. Add the fresh basil over the top. Serve over squiggly pasta (which is also known as rotini) or your pasta of choice.

I'm also thinking an add of a big handful of spinach will add some more diverse flavor and color to the dish and perhaps some mushrooms or red pepper flakes for a bit more spice so have at it and "marry" in whatever will be taste pleasing to you. The next two options are meatless options but relationships are about compromise and adding and subtracting to the "menu" as each relationship ebbs and flows and the pasta-bilities play out so a side of meatballs, an Italian sausage or herby Italian marinated chicken or fish kabobs because no limit to the pasta-bilities, right?

Orzo with Broccoli

- 1 cup orzo pasta
 2 cups broccoli florets
 2 tablespoons olive oil
 2 cloves garlic, minced
 1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes (optional)
- 3 cups vegetable broth
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Fresh herbs of choice

Bring the vegetable broth to a boil in a large pot. Add the orzo and cook according to package directions until tender but firm. During the last 2 minutes of cooking add the broccoli florets to the boiling pot to blanch them. Drain the orzo and broccoli reserving about 1/2 cup of the cooking broth. In the same pot, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the garlic and red pepper flakes cooking just until the garlic becomes fragrant. Return the orzo and broccoli to the pot. Pour in the reserved broth and stir in the Parmesan cheese and mix until the dish has a creamy texture. Season with salt and pepper to taste and for an additional 2-3 minutes while stirring. Garnish with fresh herbs of choice.

This final option mimics the "red sauce" heavy way the style of "Italian" cooking I mostly experienced growing up and so it screams "comfort." And it serves not only as a hearty meal but as a pasta-bility to toss together to offer to others as life continues to play out and relationships with neighbors and friends and loved ones require a comforting hearty offering to elevate or sooth or help deepen any relationship more fully. When was the last time you invited the neighbors over to break bread. Whip this up and have at it. Invite them to bring the salad or garlic rolls and a dessert a tv dinner would be proud to offer. A tavola non s'Invecchia"

Easy Baked Ziti

1 (16 ounce) package ziti pasta

- 24 ounces ricotta cheese
- 1 pound shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1 large egg, beaten
- 1 large jar spaghetti sauce
- ¹/₄ cup grated Parmesan cheese

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Lightly grease a 9x13-inch baking dish. Add ziti pasta to large pot of salted boiling water and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente; Drain. Combine cooked ziti, ricotta cheese, mozzarella cheese, egg, and 1 ½ cups spaghetti sauce. Transfer into the prepared baking dish. Top with remaining spaghetti sauce, then sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake 30 minutes; let stand for 15 minutes before serving.

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General Obligation Bond Update

Most of the General Obligation Bond (GOB) projects are nearing completion. As we have been reporting over the last five years since the GOB was approved by voters in 2019, these GOB projects are the result of much public input. Here in the Lakes, we are fortunate to have a handful of very important GOB projects. All of which are fully under way. In charge of implementing all these various GOB projects is the City's Design and Construction Management (DCM) Dept. headed by Director Jose Cortes. The GOB referendum passed by roughly a 60 to 40% margin in support so the residents who voted saw the value in the slight increase in property taxes over the next 20 or so years. The goal is to have most if not all of the projects completed by this year's 100 year anniversary. Here is a current update on the projects in the Lakes neighborhood:

Hollywood Beach Golf Club - This project includes a complete update and slight modifications to the course layout. The new clubhouse/community center using "Spanish" style architecture based upon the 1924 original design by Martin L. Hampton will include a parking lot in the SW corner of the property at 17th Ave and Polk Street, the original historic location. The project includes a new golf cart building, restroom upgrades, renovation of site landscaping, and irrigation and is in close coordination with renovation and redesign of the golf course which will include site drainage improvements and raising the east side of the golf course to allow faster recovery after rain events. The original GOB Funding for this project was \$12,798,726. However, with post-pandemic inflation and the desire to add more space to accommodate large meetings, the City Commission has ponied up more funding for the club house/ community center. The design team consists of Richard Mandell Golf Course Architecture for the course redesign and Bermello Ajamil & Partner, Inc. for the clubhouse led by Lakes resident Scott Bakos. AS you can see when driving by the course, most of the dirt moving is complete and the grassing will begin this month. The Clubhouse/Community Center construction has also commenced. Depending on how the upcoming spring and summer growing season goes, we should be playing golf there this fall!

TIDAL FLOODING MITIGATION



- **Tidal Flooding Mitigation and Sea Walls** - Flooding mitigation where no current shoreline protection exists on City owned property includes three phases of Tidal Flooding Mitigation with improvements to existing shoreline protection. Concept plans and drawings are complete for all 22 areas of the project and bids have been received for the first phase of the work (streets ends on both lakes). The City was able to secure another \$4 million dollar grant bringing up the total funds for the important project to \$32 million. The photo below shows the location of the phases. Different techniques and structures will be utilized such as sea walls, revetment and natural barriers. The first phase already under way is shown with blue circles. As this GOB project moves forward, more public meetings will be held to keep Lakes residents updated.

- Holland Park and Sailors Point – The restrooms have been completed as have the parking lot and walkway resurfacing and the pavilions work. The major item left there is the observation tower improvements.

- **Lakes Public Parks:** All the park improvement in the GOB funding are complete. These parks are: Joe Dimaggio Park, John B. Kooser Park and Jefferson Park.

- **Traffic Calming** - Traffic Improvements include pedestrian safety, signage & swale enhancements. Phase I study is completed and the bids have been received. Work is expected to start in the Lakes neighborhood this summer.

- **Art and Culture Center:** Work is progressing on the addition to the Center now that the FPL power lines have been relocated. This icon project will add a new space to the Center and expand the usable area for performance arts and other exhibits.

The HLCA Board of Directors is very excited that these Lakes projects were included in the GOB and thanks Lakes residents for voting to approve the funding. The GOB Advisory Committee, a group of volunteer Hollywood residents, meets every other month and looks carefully at every project to assure that the City team is doing the best they can and has already seen cost reductions and savings based upon the DCM team's hard work. The City has posted on the City web site a dedicated page that reviews all the projects with current updates and copies of presentations made to the Advisory Committee. 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Simple, Sustainable Habits By Sarah Gomez – HLCA Member

Kermit may have thought it was hard being green, but adopting eco-friendly habits is easy. Here are some simple ways to make your daily routine more sustainable:

1. Skip Bottled Water - Invest in a high-quality reusable water bottle and take it with you everywhere. Fill it up throughout the day and eliminate the need for single-use plastic bottles.

2. Choose Recyclable Options - Opt for products with non-plastic or easily recyclable packaging whenever possible. Glass is easier to clean and recycle, and it often costs the same.

3. Use Reusable Bags - Replace disposable plastic bags with reusable ones. While Ziploc bags have their place, they shouldn't be your default. Invest in silicone bags, like those from Stasher, for various needs.

4. Repurpose Plastic Containers - Save and reuse plastic containers from takeout for storing food, snacks, art supplies, or small household items like screws and hair ties.

5. Reduce Paper Towel Use - Make paper towels less accessible by storing them out of sight. Keep a supply of rags or old washcloths for cleaning up spills. If you do use paper towels, opt for recycled versions, which are less appealing to use and more cost-effective.

6. Bring Your Own Bags - Always use reusable grocery bags. Keep them in your car and return them to your car after each shopping trip. Use them for all types of shopping, not just groceries.

7. Recycle and Reuse Plastic Bags - Recycle plastic bags at Publix or repurpose them as liners for bathroom trash cans.

8. Compost Food Scraps - Cut down on household waste by composting food scraps. Compostable materials make up about 40% of household waste. Start a compost bin at home or join the City of Hollywood's community compost pilot program. Visit cityofhollywood.org for details.

9. Walk or Bike - Take advantage of our neighborhood's walkable location. Opt for walking or biking instead of driving whenever possible. This reduces your carbon footprint and benefits your physical and mental health.

10. Consider Becoming a 1-Car Family - If feasible, reduce to one car. This encourages more thoughtful use of transportation and promotes public or alternative modes of transport.

11. Shop Second-Hand - Prioritize second-hand items for clothes, furniture, and appliances. It's both eco-friendly and budget conscious. Check out Goodwill and the thrift store on Dixie Highway.

12. Use Online Retailers as a Last Resort - Use platforms like Amazon only when necessary. Explore alternative options and avoid sites that don't align with your sustainability values.

13. Plant Native Species - Choose Florida native plants for your garden as they require less water, are low-maintenance, and support local biodiversity. Look for native plants at local nurseries like Florida Nursery Mart instead of big-box stores.

14. Share and Borrow - Before buying new items, ask friends, family, or neighbors if you can borrow them. This applies to everything from household gadgets to special occasion outfits. Return items in good condition and offer to share your own items in return.

15. Reuse and Repair - Instead of discarding broken items, try to repair them. Reuse materials whenever possible and consider upcycling old items into something new and useful. You Tube is a great learning resource.

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
